This shift has been plaimed pronounced as the Library bserved, in precisely the kind of dynamic materials that cataloging standards require any Library to aissessaluating the suitability of a subject heading in use aits prospective modification indeed, in recent years many national newsorganizations (including the Associated Press, USA ABC, Chicago Tribune, and Sangeles Times) categorically have stopped using the word "illegal" to describe human beings a matter of editorial policy

Moreover, the Pew Research Center has documentedttheit actions were not merely anecdotal or aberrant in any way. the contrary, Pewcompareduse of the term^] o o P o o] vin U. Snewspapers during the same two eek period in 1996, 2002, 2007 and 2013 (all times when immigration matters were much time news) It found that use of that phrasedeclined predictionally over the most recent-lear period surveyed appearing no 21% of newsreports in 2007 but just 5% in 2013 a 76% reduction in usand all-time low.
