We hope HIS will receive enough to make ational critical investments in programs like the Library Serves and Technology Act (LSTA).

America's more than 120,000 libraries—in everongressional district—constitute a robust infrastructure immediately available to addressonal priorities in efficient, cost-effective ways and meet many of the challenges our oatfaces. Libraries play a critical in every community. From assisting veterans in their ansition to civilian life, entreprenes utilizing library databases to expand their business, helping children develop literaciles and complete homework, to helping rural and underserved communities access the Internet; libraries entral to making communities a better place to live.
