"Ephemeral and Elusive: Journalism History as reading History"

Abstract: Historical evidence of readers reading journalism is ephemeral and Newspapers and magazines elusive. have been common forms of popular reading material over the past three centuries, but for that very reason, perhaps, people tended not to think much about their news reading. They did not ponder it as they might have pondered a scripture verse or a poem. And they seldom wrote much about it in diaries and letters. The historical record is thin. Though libraries are packed with newspapers, evidence for exploring reader response to those newspapers is rare. But it is not missing altogether.

This lecture is about my quest to track down some of those elusive readers. Over the past couple of decades, I have done half a dozen studies in the history of reading and readers of American journalism. In the Holley Lecture I will talk about several of those studies, paying particular attention to the nature of the evidence that I have found. The studies range in time from the 1730s to the 1910s, and the evidence ranges from diaries to subscription lists to statistical data to manuscript letters to the editor.
