In summer 2011, YALSA surveyed state youth consultants on their training needs. In the survey, state consultants stated that they were interested in teen-focused training manuals; 59% indicated interest in a digital literacy/teens and technology manual, and 27% were interested in an adolescent development/behavior manual. These training manuals would provide state consultants with information, activ2(a)4(nua),nformprovu

These supplements would incorporate new developments in the field. The complete manual would be revised and reissued on a set-schedule approximately every 3-5 years.
