In time, a search engine will be implemented that will allow members to search both the Web site and the Communities simultaneously, but the applications themselves will remain separate. That said, the two systems will share common login credentials for all members, so that you will not need to learn a new login and password – and if you log on to one system and then try to visit the other, you will not need to log on again.
